Asensio was honored for founding the Migrant Association of Southern Florida, which has organized the donation of 132

mobile homes as permanent housing for farmworker families since 1989. Three years ago, she also founded the Caridad Health Clinic west of Boynton Beach.

Perlyn began his charitable campaign five years ago when he bought shoes with money he had received for his bar mitzvah and gave them to children at the Children's Home Society in Broward.
